
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
- In early 1960s, 123 children from low-income families in Ypsilanti, Mich.
- Children randomly selected to attend Perry or control group.
- High-quality program with well trained teachers, daily classroom sessions and weekly home visits.
- Tracked participants and control group through age 40.

Benefit-cost ratio = \$16 to \$1

- Total annual rate of return = 18%
- Public rate of return = 16%




Rate or Return for Other Longitudinal Studies

- Abecedarian Educational Child Care
 - Total annual rate of return (inflation-adjusted): ≈7%
- Chicago-Child Parent
 - Total annual rate of return (inflation-adjusted): ≈ 20%

Elmira Prenatal/Early Infancy Project Higher-Risk Families

Home visiting program by registered nurses for at-risk mothers, prenatal through first two years of child's life. Randomly selected participants were compared with a control group.

≈20% total annual rate of return (inflation-adjusted)


Elmira Prenatal/Early Infancy Project High-Risk Families

 - Quality Rating System: Parent Aware
 - Scholarship-Parent Mentor Pilot





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Parent Aware

- Goals
 - Support parents with information about quality of ECE programs
 - Promote program quality improvement through market forces and technical assistance
- Voluntary 4-star scale rating system
- Includes centers, family child care, Head Start and school-based pre-k



Market-based approach to ECE

- Demand-side
 - Empower parents with tools: parent mentors and scholarships
- Supply-side
 - Providers compete for scholarship families
 - Must achieve 3-star Parent Aware rating

Scholarship Program Provides:

Families with a 3-year-old:

- Parent mentoring to age 5 or kindergarten entry
- Scholarship to attend a high quality ECE program

Families with a 0-1 year old:

- Parent mentoring to age 5 or kindergarten entry
- Scholarship at age 3



Scholarship Program Eligibility

Residence: Live in Frogtown or North End St. Paul

Income: Below 185% of poverty

Child Age: Either age 3 or age 0-1 on September 1st of current school year





Parent Mentoring

- Assess child's health needs
- Help parents choose quality child care
- Keep families connected to scholarship program

MELF Scholarship Evaluation Findings

Based on interviews by SRI

- Increased awareness of high-quality ECE programs
- High satisfaction with implementation
- Challenges:
 - Transportation
 - Recruitment: Person-to-person works best



Scholarship parent responses

- Enthusiastic about the program
- Program considered user friendly
- Participation provided school and work opportunities
- Strong positive opinions about parent mentors





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Next Steps

- Other scholarship-based programs underway: Sioux Falls and Denver
- Interest in scholarship model from other communities:
 Detroit and Virginia
- Federal level: Early Childhood Challenge Grants



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
